Dear Parent, Carer, Community Member,

**Re: Attleborough and Rosecroft Primary Federation Governing Board
Academy Status Consultation**

The governing body has been reviewing the short- and long-term strategy for the Federation and to this end and considering recent government plans for the future of education (the Education White Paper published in March 2022) governors have taken the decision to actively consider academisation. The governors have concluded that it will be in the best interests of current and future pupils at the Federation to act now to choose a Multi-Academy Trust which shares our values, ethos, and ambitions for children, and which has the capacity to make our schools great.

Governors have explored the possibility of joining Sapientia Education Trust as this trust offers the best combination of ethos, values, capacity, financial strength, and leadership to take the schools forward and maintain the unique qualities that we value for our children and our staff.

A consultation period will run from **Tuesday 2nd July until 2nd October 2024** to share information and seek views from our community including parents and staff. The views of the Local Authority are also being sought.

When the consultation period is complete the governors will consider any responses and act in the best interests of the schools when making decisions about the academy conversion application.

Context:

The White Paper proposes that all schools in England will become academies within Multi Academy Trusts (MATs) by 2030. This means that all schools which have not yet converted to academy status will be required to join a trust or be assigned to a trust by the Regional Schools Commissioner or the Local Authority over the next few years. Multi-Academy Trusts receive funding directly from the Department for Education.

Over the last few years, the proportion of funding for schools which is allocated via the Local Authority has been reducing; for example, almost all funding grants for school improvement are now allocated via MATs and most of the funding allocated directly for premises building and repair is allocated via MATs.

For anyone who cannot attend the meeting we will also be able to answer questions sent in response to the consultation via email (see email address above). Representatives from Sapientia Education Trust will attend the meetings to answer any questions about the trust or the conversion process.

Why are the governors considering conversion to Academy status?

The organisation of schools in England will change rapidly in the next few years. The expectation of the government is that all schools will work together and support one another within academy trusts. The Department for Education expects academy trusts and Teaching School Hubs to be the providers of school improvement and development support. Local Authority support for schools is diminishing as the government moves funding for education away from local council control. This shift in funding patterns reduces the scope for non-academy schools to apply for additional funding and support to enhance the educational experience of the pupils. In future, support for school improvement will come mainly from academy trusts.

There is a possibility, if we do nothing, that at some point the schools may be in the position of having to join an academy trust which may not share our values. Therefore, governors believe that it is time to act to safeguard the ethos and strengths of our Federation, protect our pupils and staff from future isolation or loss of representation and to widen the support we can offer and receive from other schools.

What are the opportunities and benefits of academy conversion?

The emerging structure of education in England is built around many Multi-Academy Trusts (MATs). A MAT is a charitable company which must operate as not-for-profit organisation in the interests of the community it serves. The funding for education is allocated by the Department for Education (DfE) directly to the MATs and the MAT has control over the use of the funds.

The schools within The Attleborough and Rosecroft Primary Federation have much to gain from joining Sapientia Education Trust. We are planning to join a MAT which is well established and has an excellent record of school improvement in our area.

We expect pupils to benefit by having access to a wider range of staff skills, resources, and facilities. These are likely to enhance the curriculum that we offer, the range of activities for pupils, the process of transition between schools and increase the potential learning experiences through the school.

Staff will benefit from wider access to professional development with a larger group of colleagues. The schools will have greater access to subject specific expertise and relevant training. As part of a larger group of schools our staff should have access to a wider range of specialist expertise including SEND and intervention leadership. Many MATs also see improved recruitment and retention of staff due to the wider variety of jobs and career opportunities available with the trust.

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As part of a group of schools in a MAT there are financial opportunities including improved contracts for services (maintenance, catering, supplies etc). These economies of scale also extend to the provision of back-office systems and services such as accounting and management information. In general, a larger group of schools will be more resilient than a single school and better able to manage the sort of risks and uncertainties we have seen in the last few years.

Which MAT will we apply to join?

Governors have asked the DfE to consider governor's request to join Sapientia Education Trust during the consultation period.

Sapientia Education Trust recognises the individuality of each community and supports a high degree of delegation to academies. The academies are led by Headteachers with clear accountabilities reporting to the Chief Executive of the Trust.

How long will it take?

2nd July to 2nd October 2024: consultation period.

w/c 30th September: views from the consultation will be considered by Governors and the decision whether to proceed or not will be made.

1st January 2025: Expected conversion date – if the decision is made to proceed.

Pupils' education will not be affected during this period of change. The Federation will continue to operate as normal.

What is an Academy?

An academy is a school which receives funding directly from the Department for Education rather than via the Local Authority (Norfolk County Council). School funding is allocated via a national funding formula for all schools which is intended to ensure that all schools and academies will receive an equivalent amount of money based mainly on the number of pupils. Schools which are not academies currently receive slightly less direct funding than an academy trust because some of their funds are "de-delegated" back to the Local Authority to provide some shared services.

Local Authorities compete directly with academy trusts and teaching school hubs for school improvement funding and capital funding for building improvements. Academies will be able to submit bids for additional funding through their MAT.

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Academy trusts have:

- complete control of and responsibility for their own finances,
- the responsibility to manage all the external services the schools require,
- the choice to work with external providers of the trust's choosing to secure best value,
- automatic access to capital funding in the form of the School Condition Allocation (for MATs with more than 5 schools and 3,000 pupils. Sapientia Education Trust has access to School Condition Allocation capital funding)

How is an academy governed?

The MAT board sets out the strategic vision for the trust and oversees the governance structures within which the schools work.

Each school is seen as central to its own community and on its own journey of improvement which will be supported by the MAT, with the skills of each school being used in a supportive way for all the others. Sapientia Education Trust is clear that the individual ethos, character and good practices of each school are retained and that all the schools operate as equals supporting each other.

How will staff contract terms and conditions be affected?

The Academy Trust employs staff directly rather than the Local Authority which means that staff terms and conditions of service can be set by the MAT. If the school converts to become an academy all staff will transfer to be employed by the MAT on their existing terms and conditions (under TUPE regulations). The MAT is subject to the same requirements as an LA-maintained school for consultation on staff terms and conditions.

Will there be changes to the Admissions Policy?

Academies are responsible for setting their own admissions policy but must comply with the Government's Schools' Admissions Code.

Will the school's responsibilities in relation to Special Educational Needs change?

No, responsibilities as an Academy in relation to Special Educational Needs will be just the same as they are now in a maintained school. The Local Authority will continue to be the Admissions Authority for the MAT as it retains responsibility for Special Education Needs.

Can a child with an Education Health and Care Plan nominate an academy as their school of choice?

Yes, these arrangements and related processes must at all times comply with the School Admissions Code. The responsibilities of an Academy in relation to Special Educational Needs will be just the same as they are now as a maintained school.

Does becoming an Academy change the way in which exclusions are dealt with?

Academies are required by their Funding Agreement to follow the law and guidance on exclusions as if they were maintained schools. This includes reporting exclusions to the Local authority. However, Academies do not have to consult the Local Authority before deciding to exclude a pupil and they can arrange their own independent appeals panel.

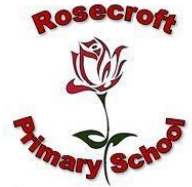
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Will the schools change their names and uniforms as some Academies have done?

No, there are no plans for the schools to change their names or uniforms when they become academies.

Are Academies subject to the same Ofsted inspection regime?

Yes, schools converting to become academies will continue to be inspected in the normal way.
